Between the Fish and the Soup

by Jacob Solomon

Please take my gift which comes to you (Esau) for G-d favored me (Jacob) and I have everything. (33:11)

In short, this week's Parasha is one of temporary — though spectacular — trials and tribulations, towards a greater goal.

The Parasha opens with the elaborate preparations that Jacob made to appease the wrath Esau might well be holding against him for his loss of the Birthright and the Blessing. Jacob pressed Esau to take a slice of his wealth on the grounds that G-d had favored him and given him "kol" — literally "all."

In the Grace after Meals, we ask G-d to bless us as "He blessed our Patriarchs Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob 'bakol mikol kol' — 'in all, from all, all.' "This is based on the following verses:

- 1. G-d had blessed Abraham "bakol" "in all" (24:1)
- 2. Isaac trembled greatly (when Esau presented him with freshly hunted venison) and said: "Who where is the one who hunted venison, brought it to me, and I ate 'mikol' 'from all.' " (27:33)

 3. "Please take my gift which comes to you
- 3. "Please take my gift which comes to you (Esau) for G-d favored me (Jacob) and I have 'kol' 'all.' " (33:11)

"Bakol" is for Abraham — who is known foremost for his "chesed" — kindness (c.f. Micah 7:20). "Mikol" connects with Isaac, who is attributed with "pachad" — fear and deep respect of G-d (31:42, Ibn Ezra ad loc), and "gevura" (dignified spiritual strength) (Sam. II 22:26, Rashi ad loc). Jacob is associated with "emet" — truth (Micah, ad loc), and "temimut" — modest decency (25:27).

These words "bakol mikol kol" appear to fit the respective strengths of the Patriarchs. Abraham needed to be blessed in everything. For "chesed" addresses the requirements of others. Each person's needs are different. One person needs a loan, a second has to satisfy his hunger, the third seeks means of earning a living, the fourth yearns for a listening and understanding ear. A "baal chesed" — a person continually involved in helping others — needs a large range of resources. He needs to go "ba-kol" — "in" to access "all" — needs to be "in" to a large range of connections to maximize his resources to assist Humanity. In contrast, the sources of Isaac's strengths are spiritual — "pachad" and "gevura." His spiritual impact and contribution needs to be backed with affluence - albeit to a lesser degree than a "baal chesed." (Indeed, no major personality in the Tenach ever suffered long-term poverty.) Thus "mi-kol" — "from all" - was sufficient for Isaac's needs, for he did not need to draw on material resources to the same degree as Abraham.

And Jacob — whose hallmarks are "emet" — truth, and "temimut" — decency —

needed merely "all" — all required to satisfy his own needs — no more and no less. So he would not miss the huge donation he wished to pass on to Esau. Indeed, when Jacob traveled to Haran twenty years previously, he only asked for the bare essentials — "bread to eat and clothes to wear" (28:20) — so that he would have the necessities to carry out his role in life — as the third Patriarch of the future Israelite nation. As the Radak explains, the righteous only ask for necessities, not luxuries. That was "kol" — "all" to Jacob.

Thus a deeper meaning of the words: "bakol mikol kol" — "in all, from all, all" is that we pray to G-d after a meal to give us according to our needs — "as our Fathers were blessed (according to their needs) ... so may we all be blessed" (according to our needs). (Grace after Meals).

Ovadiah (Obadiah) 1:1-1:21

This week's Haftorah is the entire book of Ovadiah, which consists of one chapter of 21 verses. Ovadiah is the shortest book of the Tanach and is part of the book known as Trei Asar, or "Twelve," in that it contains 12 books of the minor prophets.

Ovadiah's entire prophecy concerns punishment for Edom, who are the descendants of Esav — hence the connection to this week's parsha, Vayishlach. Rashi states that Ovadiah was an Edomite convert to Judaism and, as such, was chosen to deliver the prophecy of Edom's punishment.

There is no information on who Ovadiah is within the book of Ovadiah itself, but an Ovadiya is mentioned in M'lachim (Kings) I, 18:3, "And Ovadiya feared G-d greatly," and the rabbis of the Talmud state that this Ovadiya is the prophet of our Haftorah. Ovadiya was the manager of King Achav's house. That would place Ovadiah around 920-890 BCE. He was therefore a contemporary of Eliyahu and Elisha. Achav had a non-Jewish wife named Ezevel (Jezebel) who was a daughter of King Ethbaal of Tyre and a Phoenician. She was a great-aunt to Dido, who was the founder of Carthage. She was evil and sought to impose her idolatrous religion in Israel, to the extent that she actually hunted down the prophets and killed many of them. Ovadiah, at great personal risk, hid 100 prophets in two caves, 50 to a cave.

The book of Ovadiah starts thus, "The vision of Ovadiah: thus says the Lord G-d to Edom, 'We have heard this from G-d, and an envoy was sent from the nations ... let's arise against her for war.' "He goes on to express G-d's wrath at Edom, and the punishment that Edom will endure. Why? Verses 10 and 11

explain: "Because of the violence to your brother Yaakov (Jacob), you will be covered with shame ... forever." "On the day you stood by when strangers captured his army and foreigners entered his gates and cast lots for Y'rushalayim (Jerusalem) ... you were as one of them."

So what event does this refer to? Ibn Ezra feels this refers to the destruction of the first Temple by Nebuchadnezar. Ibn Ezra says that they encouraged him to destroy Israel, but later he turned on them and destroyed their land. Radak maintains that this refers to the destruction of the second Temple, as the Romans are considered to be Edomites, and, in his opinion, the punishment mentioned is to occur at the end of days with the return of the King of Y'hudah (Judah).

Verse 18 describes Edom's punishment, "And the house of Yaakov shall be fire ... and the house of Esav shall be straw ... and no remnant shall remain of the house of Esav: for G-d has spoken." Finally, the Haftorah ends with a famous verse that we find in the daily prayers (right before yishtabach): "W'alu moshiim b'har Tzion lishpot eth har esau ... lashem ham'lucha." "The rescuers shall ascend Mt. Tzion (Zion) to judge Mt. Esav ... kingship shall be G-d's."



The Thirteenth Gate

The question was raised as to why there are different customs regarding the order of prayer [such as Ashkenaz and Sephard], and how each individual should pray. I replied that it is impossible to adequately explain these things in writing. But the following can be revealed:

Our sages teach us that [a person entering and leaving] the Holy Temple would have to bow 13 times, paralleling the 13 gates [of the Temple]. These are also alluded to in the Book of Ezekiel, where each tribe will have its own gate when the holiness of Jerusalem is restored to the status it had in the time of the Temple. The thirteenth gate ... is for the individual who does not know from which of the twelve tribes he originates.

It is known that the Temple here on earth paralleled the celestial Temple. The Holy Temple on high therefore also has a gate for each tribe, as explained in the writings of the Ari.

Paralleling these gates were the 13 times that a person had to bow. These kneelings

involved the transmission [of the spiritual sustenance that flows through these gates] as is known to those who delve into the writings of the Ari.

The concept of prayer is therefore [the key with which] each individual enters through his own gate. We are thus taught that prayer is "the ladder standing on earth, with its head reaching the heavens." (Gen. 28:12) Each gate has its own combination, and it is for this reason that there are different orders of prayer. [Each of the twelve tribes has its own liturgy.]

The thirteenth gate, however, is for the individual who does not know from which of the twelve tribes he originates. Since he does not know which gate to use, [he can use this one] to enter the King's courtyard.

This thirteenth gate also parallels the thirteenth Attribute of Mercy, which is "and cleanses." This includes the other twelve Attributes, as is known to those who comprehend. The godly Ari ... arranged a special order of prayer based on all the others.

Knowing the paths of heaven as he did, the godly Ari taught a way for those who do not know from which tribe they originate. For this reason, he arranged a special order of prayer based on all the others, as is known to those who are well versed.

It may then be asked why the other twelve gates were needed, since they are all included in the thirteenth. Why is the thirteenth gate not enough? The answer is, however, that each tribe originally knew its own particular order of prayer, and it was certainly best for each one to enter through its own gate.

Now that people do not know the tribe of their origin, and we also do not know which customs apply to which tribes, it is best to follow the order arranged by the Ari, which is universal. [Editor's note: Anyone who knows clearly his family's version of prayer, yet is considering changing, should consult an authoritative rabbi as to the advisibility of doing so.]

The prophet Ezekiel predicted that in the Ultimate Future there would only be twelve

gates in Jerusalem [one for each tribe]. The reason for this is that everyone will then know his own tribe.

The shul has started a nightly men's Bais Medrash. We have some Kollel young men learning in the Bais Medrash each night, and we invite you to come and learn at shul with your chavrusa any night or nights from Sunday through Thursday.

If you do not have a chavrusa, Elie Levi, who is running and organizing the program, will be happy to help you find one. If there is anyone who would be interested in learning Nesivos Shalom or Gemara Brachos one night a week, he's already got one picked out for you.

The learning begins at 8 pm followed by maariv at 9. You may continue to learn after maariv, as well. Rabbi Goldberger will be giving the Tur Bais Yoseph shiur, which we began last year, after maariv several nights per week and will attend the Bais Medrash as often as his schedule allows.

Shuie Goldfinger will be giving a shiur on Thursday nights from 8:30-9 pm from the sefer Shmiras Shabbos Kihilchosa about Hilchos Schitah (squeezing fruits for their juices).
