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### **PARSHAH OVERVIEW**

Hashem speaks to Moshe Rabbeinu about the redemption of the Jewish people. Moshe and Aharon are appointed as the redeemers, and Hashem promises to harden Pharaoh's heart. Aharon performs a miracle in front of Pharaoh. The Ten Plagues begin: Blood, frogs, lice, wild animals, death of cattle, boils, and hail. Hashem hardens the heart of Pharaoh, and Pharaoh still refuses to send out the Jewish people.

# **OUICK VORT**

We can learn a valuable lesson from the passage in the Torah that tells us the Jewish people experienced קצר רוח ועבדה - קשה - shortness of breath and hard labor.

On some level, perhaps the phrase קצר רוח ועבדה קשה can be understood as an if-youdo-this-then-this can happen.

The Jewish people are successful when their spiritual intake and focus is up to Gd's par, so-to-speak.

When we are experiencing - קצר רוח - a shortness, a limitation, a reduction of , i.e., spirituality, then that is a recipe for a life of עבדה קשה, great hardship and toiling, ch'v.

The more spiritually focused we are in life, the easier our "work" is going to be, because the more we include Hashem in our lives, the more He helps us along the way.

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# **GEMATRIA**

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is מִקֹצֵר רוּחַ וּמֵעֲבֹדֶה קָשָׁה The gematria of מִקֹצֵר רוּחַ וּמֵעֲבֹדֶה 1,176.

One of the messages of this phrase (see quick vort) is the importance of not limiting one's spirituality. - קצר רוח when there is a limitation and reduction of spirituality, then עבדה קשה - we often experience hardship, i.e. a life stripped away from meaning and spirituality is a life of suffering.

The passuk in Tehilim (116:17) - לך-אזבח, ל also has the זבח תודה; ובשם ה' אקרא gematria of 1,176. Instead of limiting our spirituality, let us increase our spirituality and connection with Hashem!

If I were to arrange My Top 3 Most-Boring Things To Do list, it would look like this (not in any particular order): 1. Jury Duty, 2. Jury Duty, and 3. Jury Duty.

About a year ago, I paid duty to my civil rights and partook in Jury Duty. I had a high number, 3063, and I knew that I would likely be waiting around in the waiting room (because that is what you do in a waiting room, you wwwaaaaaaaiiiiiiiitttttt) for a long time.

Of course, I did my best to make use of the waiting time, and I learned a bit and was able to get some work done as well.

I am not familiar with all court houses around the country, but the Jury Duty location in Maryland at the Mitchell Courthouse in Downtown Baltimore, has multiple vending machines in the waiting room, which, if you are waiting somewhere for a long time, can become a great source of solid excitement, not necessarily to purchase goods, but more so to be entertained by observing others purchase goods.

Pretty much all types of feelings and emotions were evoked in my heart during the process of observing others at the vending machine at the courthouse.

I felt feelings of validation upon seeing a man staring at the vending machine for around 10 minutes, as he was contemplating, deliberating, and considering what to purchase, only to walk away with nothing, as he couldn't make up his mind. I felt feelings of pridefulness and "nachas" upon seeing a man purchase a nutrition fig bar instead of the Mike 'n Ikes box. I felt feelings of sadness upon seeing a lady pay for her bag of pretzels, only to watch as the vending machine did not dispense her product.

There was one incident, though, that stuck out to me, that chosen people. made me feel particularly happy and inspired.

A lady walked over the the vending machine, paid for a bottle of cold Mt. Dew, and upon being dispensed, she took the soda and started to walk back to her seat, when suddenly, thump! A second bottle of Mt. Dew was dispensed. Shocked, she returned to the vending machine, happily picked up the second bottle, and once again, started to walk back to her seat, when suddenly, thump! A third bottle of Mt. Dew was dispensed. She returned to the vending machine, ecstatically picked up the third bottle, and again, started to walk to her seat, when suddenly, thump! A fourth bottle of Mt. Dew was dispensed!

This time, though, the vending machine stopped giving her free Mt. Dew, and she returned to her seat with the biggest smile on her face. A victory, indeed.

Besides for being an amusing story, it is very relatable. As yidden, our experience and relationship with Hashem can be somewhat analogous to the vending machine giving out "extra" things.

You see, in life, of course we must do our part. We must put our foot forwards and do our basic *hishtadlus*. We have to "pay" for the "Mt. Dew." But after that, we leave it up to Hashem to make things actually work out.

In His Loving Kindness, Hashem deals with us with tremendous mercy that is in far greater proportion to what we "paid." Hashem goes "above and beyond," לפנים משורת הדין.

Why? Why does He do that? Simple. Because He is our Father who loves us dearly. My friends, this is the deeper secret of why Hashem didn't just take the Jewish people out of Egypt as a mere payback of His promise that he made to Abraham many years prior. If it was just in order to keep a deal, He did not have to do it the way He did. The fact that Hashem took us out of Egypt with great miracles, fanfare, and pizzaz, showcased for us His level of love that He had/has to the Jewish people.
